EDUCATION DISABILITY RIGHTS PROJECT SUCCESS STORIES

The Education Disability Rights Project (EDRP) staff attorney **Danielle Leake** assisted the family of an 8th-grade student with an auditory processing disorder, executive functioning deficits, speech delays, and certain social skills deficits. The student struggled immensely during the COVID-19 pandemic when schools were only providing remote instruction, as his disabilities did not allow him to access virtual learning. As a result, he fell behind in his work and was unable to improve when he returned to inperson learning. His school district did not offer him any help and instead wanted to place him in a more restrictive educational environment. As he would be going into high school the following year, the school district wanted to change his diploma designation from "Regents" to "Skills and Achievement Commencement Credential" ("SACC"). This would have had dire consequences for the student's future. For example, his parents wanted to ensure he would be able to attend college—a SACC would not have allowed him to do that. Upon returning to school, the student also faced bullying from other students because of the way he spoke and pronounced certain words, due to his disability. Two incidents were particularly troubling—one involved another student kicking him in the ear and another involved a different student pouring coffee into his bookbag, which destroyed all his belongings, including his school-issued chrome book. **Attorney Leake** counseled the parents on the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) process and the filing of DASA complaints; the parents hoped that these complaints would cause the school to prevent their son from being further victimized.

Attorney Leake attended multiple Committee on Special Education (CSE) meetings to advocate for an appropriate placement, but the CSE insisted on a more restrictive environment that would not offer a path to college. Based on the school's resistance, **Attorney Leake** drafted a Due Process Complaint, demanding compensatory services for the time the student was on remote instruction during the COVID-19 pandemic and also prospective tuition at a private school. Due to our efforts, the school district agreed to pay the student's private school tuition for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years.

We are happy to report that at his new school, the student receives one-on-one academic support from his teachers. Social skills therapy has enabled him to make friends and be involved in his community. The student is anticipated to receive a Regents high school diploma upon graduation, allowing him to attend a number of different colleges. He has also been able to explore a potential music career by recording his own songs for various class projects. Congratulations, **Danielle**, on a life-changing result for your client!

Advocacy Tip!

Under the McKinney Vento Act, unhoused students must have equal access to free appropriate education. An unhoused student can attend school in the district where the student presently lives, ("district of current location") or in the district where the student lived before becoming unhoused, ("district of origin"). School districts are responsible for providing transportation timely to all students, including unhoused children and youth. Every district must have a designated local liaison for homeless children and youth to assist them.

SENIOR CITIZEN LAW PROJECT SUCCESS STORIES

Staff Attorney John Ferro in the Senior Citizen Law Project was contacted by a client residing in a co-op with a no-pet policy. The client's daughter, who lives in another county, has an emotional support dog to aid with her anxiety disorder. The client's daughter was prevented from visiting her mother due to the co-op's no-pet policy. Though the client provided proof to the co-op that the dog was an emotional support dog rather than a pet, the co-op still would not allow the client's daughter to bring the dog onto the premises. **Attorney Ferro** requested a reasonable accommodation from the co-op so that her daughter could visit with her emotional support dog.

Attorney Ferro negotiated a settlement agreement with the co-op's counsel allowing the client's daughter to be accompanied by her emotional support dog when she visits her mother. **Nice work, John!**

In September 2022, the Senior Citizen Law Project was contacted by a client about a Social Security retirement problem. The client was originally from Honduras. In November 2018, the Social Security Administration (SSA) stopped the client's retirement benefits without providing any explanation. As the case developed, NSLS discovered that the benefits were stopped because of an expired Employment

Authorization Document (EAD). An EAD must be renewed by U.S. aliens residing in the United States yearly; these renewals are done through the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (CIS). CIS often approves renewals of EADs late, even for those individuals who submit early renewal requests. These delays can leave a client without a current EAD and cause the SSA to erroneously conclude that the client is unlawfully present in the U.S., even if the client has lived here for decades. Although our client, who has Temporary Protected Status (TPS), had made a timely application to renew the EAD, the CIS did not issue a renewal before the expiration date.

Staff Attorney Dan Okrent in the Senior Citizen Law Project, represented this client and filed a Reconsideration request in October 2022. Over the course of the next year, **Attorney Okrent** visited the SSA's local office repeatedly and also wrote to the Jamaica Payment Center regarding his client's benefits all without a response. Suspecting that the benefit termination was related to an EAD problem, **Attorney Okrent** sent a copy of the client's renewed EAD to the SSA Payment Center in July 2023. The client had received the EAD from CIS in July 2023 and it was valid from 1/1/23 to 6/30/24.

Despite **Attorney Okrent's** many efforts to resolve this error, the client then received a letter from the SSA in October 2023, which stated that his benefits could not be paid at that time. Unfortunately, the letter from SSA did not state a specific reason for their denial. In October 2023, Dan immediately filed an appeal of this determination. The agency never responded to Dan's appeal. Frustrated by the SSA's continued inaction on the case, in December, 2023, Dan contacted the SSA Public Affairs Specialist asking for intervention. This bold move by Dan finally resulted in a swift and successful conclusion for his client. On December 19, 2023, the client received a letter from the SSA awarding him \$43,867 in retroactive benefits. The retroactive benefits were for the period of November 2018 through November 2023. Normally, when there is an unusually high amount of retroactive benefits, the SSA will issue these benefits in two to three installments. However, our client's benefits were paid in one lump sum. We're also happy to report that in January, 2024, the client's monthly Social Security retirement benefits were finally reinstated. **Congratulations to Dan for his skilled perseverance on this case which resulted in a great outcome for his client!**

More about the Senior Citizen Law Project...

The Senior Citizen Law Project provides legal representation, advice and referrals to Nassau County seniors in matters involving housing, health care and social security. The Project also assists with wills, power of attorney and health care proxy forms, pooled trusts, Medicaid planning, consumer debt and utility shut-offs. With specific funding from the Nassau County Office for the Aging, the Project assists Nassau County seniors age 60 and older who have a legal issue which meets our priority guidelines. CIVIL RIGHTS PROJECT SUCCESS STORIES

Our **Civil Rights Project (CRP)** was contacted by a 70-year-old man who was incarcerated for most of his life. Despite his lengthy incarceration, our client did everything possible to better himself. He was a mentor and leader during his incarceration which in turn earned him a proclamation from the New York State Assembly for his work with other prisoners.

After being released by the system with little to no skills, our client was desperate to find permanent housing. Without a job or a retirement fund, the public housing system was his only choice for housing stability. Our client contacted the Community Development Long Island (CDLI) to apply for a Section 8 voucher but was quickly denied due to his criminal background.

After being denied Section 8 housing, our client contacted NSLS's **CRP Staff Attorney Ellen Hoil.** Attorney Hoil, continuously contacted the CDLI through multiple emails, phone calls, and letters informing them we were advocating for our client. Attorney Hoil quickly succeeded in having his denial re-examined and overturned. Several studies have demonstrated that housing promotes stability, improves connections to health and behavioral health services, reduces recidivism, and ends institutional cycling. Our client has since found a place to call home with his Section 8 voucher. With the motivation to turn his life around, contacting NSLS was his ultimate lifeline. **Great work, Ellen!**

Mr. F was denied employment as a sports official by the Department of Education due to his criminal background check. Mr. F worked with Staff Attorney Daniel Smith and Supervising Attorney John Batanchiev of the Civil Rights Project to work to resolve this issue. Attorney Smith assisted Mr. F in requesting a RAP sheet (record of arrests and prosecutions). Upon receiving the RAP sheet, we discovered that he had two open criminal cases to the surprise of Mr. F. The open criminal cases were in California and Georgia. After doing some research, we determined that the Georgia criminal case was very recently dismissed and sealed but had not been updated in his background check nor his RAP sheet. We also discovered that the California open criminal case was a day after another arrest for the same offense. The original arrest showed he was incarcerated and released two days later. Based on this information he would have been incarcerated when the second arrest for the same offense would have occurred. Attorney Batanchiev and Attorney Smith successfully demonstrated to the Department of Education that the second arrest must have been a mistake and that he did not have an open criminal matter in California. With this new information, the Department of Education approved Mr. F's clearance to be a sports official. Congratulations, Danny and John, on your diligent efforts to secure a win for Mr. F!

NASSAU COMMUNITY LEGAL HELP PROJECT SUCCESS STORIES

Mr. X came to the Resource Center at District Court, Nassau County, where the Community Legal Help Project (CLHP) sets up shop every Thursday. Mr. X is a tenant who did his own Order to Show Cause (OSC) which had been denied. Even though Mr. X had attached a copy of the paid-in-full check, the judge wanted him to provide proof that he paid the arrears according to the stipulation he had signed months earlier. Mr. X did not pay according to the Stipulation of Settlement, however, before he was to be evicted, he did bring his account up to date.

The **CHLP Staff Attorney and Coordinator, Roberta Scoll**, helped Mr. X prepare a new OSC, this time attaching, not just a copy of the canceled check, but in the interim he had received the latest rent ledger showing he only owed the current month's rent, which was also attached to the new OSC.

The next week, he saw **Attorney Scoll** in Court, and gave her a big hug and thanks as his case was dismissed. **Congratulations, Roberta!**

PRO BONO SUCCESS STORIES



Disabled Senior Can Be At Ease Now That Her Affairs Are in Order

A 61-year-old disabled woman contacted the **Volunteer Lawyer's Project** (VLP) to request assistance in creating a will, power of attorney (POA), and health care proxy. Although the client's sole income consisted of Supplement Security Income, she did have some items of value that she wanted to ensure were left to her three adult children and grandchildren in a will. In addition, she wanted to have her affairs in order by having a healthcare proxy and power of attorney drafted in the event she was unable to make financial and healthcare decisions on her own. **VLP Staff Attorney and Coordinator Reisa Brafman** recognized that this client was homebound due to her disability and would need a volunteer attorney to meet with the client at her home to sign the will, health care proxy and POA. **Attorney Brafman** successfully recruited new **VLP pro bono attorney Jeanne Ellen Forster** to assist this client with her legal needs in her home. The client shared that "she was very happy with the attorney. The attorney was accommodating by coming to my home. Everything was great and the service was good." Many thanks to **Jeanne Ellen Forster, Esq.** for offering her legal expertise and services free of charge and for going to the client's home in light of the circumstances. Great job to **VLP staff Paralegal Eva Elibert, Paralegal Stephanie Gerland, and Attorney Reisa Brafman** for their dedication and support in coordinating an attorney for this client.



Long Time Volunteers Assist Client With Life-Changing Bankrupcty

The client was a 76-year-old woman whose sole income was approximately \$1,100 per month from Social Security Retirement. She was grieving the recent loss of her son, who died in her arms and passed away several months ago. At the height of her grief, the client discovered that her son had accrued a substantial amount of debt in her name. She believed that her son was paying all the bills, however, he was using her credit card to pay for his expenses in addition to the bills. The client felt stressed and overwhelmed by this situation as she was getting sued and had a collection matter pending in court. She also received numerous calls and letters from creditors and dreaded picking up the mail. The amount of debt that her son incurred was considerable. The total debt was approximately \$116,712 with over \$33,451 in credit card debt. The other debt included fees for EZ pass tolls and parking tickets, a loan, and money owed related to automobiles. In addition, the client had an automobile in her name that was repossessed. In light of this, the client said that she was unable to get through the day without crying from all the distress.



The client shared that she reached out to several resources and did not hear back from anyone. The client eventually called the **Volunteer Lawyers Project** (VLP) for guidance concerning whether filing Chapter 7 Bankruptcy would be the best option for her. VLP referred the client to a pro bono attorney for a bankruptcy clinic appointment. **The clinic attorney and long-time volunteer, Stuart Gelberg**, advised the client that she was eligible to file for bankruptcy and she should proceed with filing. In light of the clinic attorney's recommendation, VLP referred the client to **volunteer attorney, Scott Schneider**, to represent her in a Chapter 7 Bankruptcy proceeding from initial consultation through discharge. **Attorney Schneider** successfully obtained the Chapter 7 Bankruptcy discharge for the client and discharged all of her debts. The client said that she was "finally able to breathe again" and while sharing sentiments about Attorney Schneider, "I never met a human being like him. He was amazing, kind, gentle, and considerate. He took care of everything."

Both **Stuart and Scott** are longtime volunteers with our program and contribute to the success and service of our community. We are grateful for the work of **VLP Paralegal Eva Elibert, VLP Paralegal Stephanie Gerland, and VLP Pro Bono Coordinator and Staff Attorney Reisa Brafman** on this case.

2024 Commitment to Justice Reception Speech from NSLS Client Speaker Dayana Terry

My name is Dayana Terry, and I'd like to thank everyone for having me here today. I am honored that you chose me as your client speaker. This is my first time speaking in front of a large crowd, but I didn't hesitate to say yes to the opportunity...I hope that my story will inspire someone in this room today. Maybe it will inspire you to push through a difficult time. Maybe it will inspire you to help someone who is struggling. Maybe it will inspire you to ask for help if you need it. Although I was born in Southampton, I was raised in the Bronx. New York City can be a rough place to grow up, but as they say, if you can make it there, you can make it anywhere. I'm grateful I grew up in the Bronx because it taught me survival skills that I've needed in my life to this day. Survival isn't a word that I thought would be central to my story, but through my experiences, I've relied on those survival skills that I learned in my early years.

Growing up I didn't attend school much. I didn't like it, and I found myself in unnecessary trouble. My mother tried to keep me in school, but I didn't go. I was placed in multiple juvenile detention centers starting at age 12. That was definitely a transition for me because it was my first time being away from my family. It was my first experience of being unsettled and not feeling at home---a theme that would continue in my life.

[B]etween the ages of 16 - 18 years old I was in and out of schools and retail jobs trying to obtain my GED, working and babysitting, which had me exhausted. At the age of 19, I got pregnant with my oldest son Zamarion who truly inspired me and gave me the drive, passion, and ambition to be the best mom that I can be. Because I now had to raise my son, I was unable to complete school, but it didn't stop me from working and providing. Zamarion was always very advanced for his age and always had a question AND an answer for you. At 23, I had my son Zyaire, and although it was a blessing to give Zamarion a little brother, it [was] overwhelming to try and balance it all. I moved back to Southampton and stayed with [my] family for about six months. I then rented out my cousin's house for almost a year, but as you all know, family and business don't work well sometimes. My boys and I went to a shelter for 4 months. During our time in the shelter, I enrolled the boys in school and maintained a job. I would search for apartments every day either by calling or going [from] place to place. I was finally able to find an apartment. The boys and I were so excited, but unfortunately, after living there for 6 months, the landlord raised the rent above what DSS would allow for my family household. The next few years continued in this pattern of moving in with family, finding a place on my own that became too expensive to live in, spending time in the shelter, and jobs upon jobs. During this time, I left with my boys to go live in Virginia Liverked retail jobs warehouse jobs cleaning jobs and restaurant jobs-live even sold food on the weekends. I New York and Virginia, I worked retail jobs, warehouse jobs, cleaning jobs, and restaurant jobs-I've even sold food on the weekends. I worked as hard as I []could, striving to provide for my family and be the best single parent I could be. However, each time I felt myself getting ahead, [getting] my family settled, [making] my boys smile at our good luck, it [] seemed like something would happen, and it was back to square one.

So back to Southampton, [we] went, at first living with family, and then [returning] to the shelter with my boys. We were in 3 different shelters in one year. About 4 months into being in the shelter I started working at Little Flower Children Family Services. Finally, I was able to start a career journey. I was so excited! I felt like I had experience for this job, not in the sense of actually working in the field, but LIFE EXPERIENCE. I can relate to the Residents because I experienced what they were going through. I think everything happens for a reason, and I believe I had to experience detention centers at an early age to be able to give back to the youth.

You may not know this, but living in a shelter is not free. Toward the end of the year in the shelter, I was told that I had to start paying \$2700 a month for rent. I could not believe it! We left. After a couple of months with family, I received a call about an apartment I had applied for. I think it was one of the most exciting moments for me and my boys. After everything we have been through, GOD blessed us with a brand-new apartment. We started off with an air mattress and a couch that was given to us. We didn't care, we were just happy to have our own place. Our first meal was sitting crisscross apple sauce on the floor. It was the best meal and feeling ever, after all we had gone through.

Things were looking up! But then, COVID hit. I started falling behind on rent. I applied for ERAP, which is the Emergency Rental Assistance Program. ERAP helped with the rental arrears. Then my mother, son, and I were in a car accident which put me out of work for 4 months. I was behind financially and received an eviction notice. I didn't know what to do because ERAP had already paid. In my paperwork, I came across Nassau Suffolk Law Services, and that's when I met my attorney, Courtney Spellman. Courtney assisted me in every way to help me with the proper resources. We worked with Family Service League, who helped me reapply for ERAP. For months Courtney and I were back and forth with ERAP, filing appeals and trying to get a positive response. Through this time, there were many dates in court, and NSLS would defend me, even when the landlord's attorney would argue that the ERAP stay should be lifted. I credit NSLS with [preventing] me from being evicted during this time. Courtney then suggested applying for a Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher, which I did. In between waiting for ERAP and Section 8, I got a second job in the school as a teacher's aide, and I also took the exam to become a teacher's assistant, which I passed. I have one more training course to complete before receiving my certificate. After months of still waiting for ERAP I decided to go to DSS because the rent was getting so backed up. DSS assisted me[-]a major relief for my family and me. Courtney and I were so excited because this looked like it was the end of a long journey. NSLS was with me during every step of the eviction proceeding until the rental arrears were paid, and the eviction was finally withdrawn.

About 4 months after applying for Section 8 they called me in to retrieve my housing choice voucher. I was so overwhelmed with joy, I cried real tears in that office, because I practically struggled all my life and my children's life. To be able to have stability was such a gift. It is a blessing I don't take for granted. Thank you, Nassau Suffolk Law Services, for pointing me towards section 8, because it is the first time I've felt confident that we are not one unfortunate incident away from going back to the shelter.

We have since upgraded to a 3-bedroom apartment, and everyone now has their own space. I even have my own bathroom, thank God, because boys will always be boys. We're in the same place, and it's such a blessing we don't have to start over again. Even though I was a little rebel when I was young, I am raising children who are respectful, compassionate, protective, helpful, humble, strong, grateful, and thankful.

I am proud of the men they are becoming. I am grateful for all my struggles, obstacles, and adversity. It takes a lot of strength, discipline, and resilience to find success and stability. I am no longer just surviving, I am thriving.

I want to thank everyone here in this room for your support, especially Nassau Suffolk Law Services. I pray my story inspires people to never give up no matter how hard life may get. There's always light at the end of the tunnel. Always keep your faith in GOD and yourself. Self-love is the best love. Thank you everyone.

Larry Tuthill, Esq.

Larry Tuthill, Esq., began his career at Nassau Suffolk Law Services in 1990 as an attorney in the Civil Unit. His primary responsibility was representing low-income and disabled tenants in District Court when the tenants were at risk of eviction or had other housing legal issues. Through his work in the Civil Unit, he prevented numerous clients and their families from becoming homeless.

A few years later Larry transferred into the HIV/AIDS Project, a project that represents those who have an HIV+ diagnosis with various legal issues. During his tenure with the HIV/AIDS Project, he assisted clients in Central Islip and Riverhead Family Court and further represented clients in divorce cases in Riverhead Supreme Court. At that time, he discovered he especially enjoyed helping this vulnerable population with their various child support orders, orders of protection, and visitation matters. He did most of the family court legal work and became an expert in this field. Soon after, Nassau Suffolk Law Services received funding to create a Domestic Violence Project. Larry quickly applied for the attorney position, and of course, due to his vast amount of experience, he was given the position.

In 2022, Larry was promoted to Supervising Attorney of the Domestic Violence Project. He currently supervises two attorneys and one paralegal. The unit represents over 250 clients per year in obtaining Orders of Protection, as well as Custody and Support Orders.

Larry is also very involved with community projects and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Southold/Peconic Civic Association. He has also previously served on the Community Action Southold Town as the Board President, the Economic Opportunity Council Board, and the North Fork Community Theatre Board as the Vice President.

Larry was previously honored as a champion for children and families living in Suffolk by the Suffolk County Advisory Board on Child Protection and the Suffolk County Executive Steve Levy's Task Force to Prevent Family Violence. In November 2023, Larry was honored with the Leadership in Law Award (Associate Category) by Long Island Business News. Thank you for all your hard work and dedication, Larry!
