Legal Services of Long Island (LSLI) continues to make major strides in providing free legal help to low-income families across Long Island. Thanks to our dedicated staff, volunteers, and supporters, we offer a wide range of programs that strengthen our community and help families tackle urgent

civil legal issues—eviction, foreclosure, domestic violence, consumer debt, elder abuse, disability, family matters, and more. By securing the protections and benefits they deserve, we empower families to build safer, more stable lives.

In 2024, our Domestic Violence Unit expanded its reach to serve the entire island. While we have long supported survivors of domestic violence in Suffolk County, we significantly increased our presence in Nassau County this year, enabling us to assist more individuals facing abuse. With new grant funding, we provided critical legal support, including helping clients obtain orders of protection to ensure their safety and security.

In Suffolk County, our foreclosure prevention work has continued to grow through innovative programs that pair clients with volunteer attorneys to guide them through settlement conferences and pro se filings. Simultaneously, our Pro Bono Unit and Community Legal Help Project have evolved to meet community needs, shifting from primarily individual cases to a clinic-based model. These clinics now include bankruptcy, 17A guardianship, and foreclosure defense support.

We are also investing in the future of legal services by welcoming passionate law students, fellows, and interns who want to dedicate their careers to public interest work. Through mentorship and training, we are cultivating the next generation of legal advocates and ensuring that our mission lasts for decades to come.

Together, these initiatives highlight our commitment to creating innovative, accessible programs that respond to emerging legal needs while ensuring every Long Islander has fair access to justice and equal representation under the law.

Public Benefits Success Stories

Worker with Disabilities Wins Unemployment Appeal After Employer Fails to Accommodate - Mr. B worked as a custodian in a court building. He was hired through an organization that integrates individuals with disabilities into the workplace ("the organization"). Mr. B was diagnosed with a "learning disability" at a very young age. He also has ADHD and anxiety. In his role as a custodian, Mr. B's supervisor provided him with a list of tasks for him to do every day. The supervisor's list provided the order in which everything was to be done (cleaning bathrooms, wiping desks in the courtroom, vacuuming, etc.). The supervisor would also provide further explanations of tasks to ease Mr. B's anxiety. This arrangement allowed Mr. B to perform his job duties and continue to be employed.

Two years into his employment, Mr. B worked under a foreman. The foreman told Mr. B to disregard his task list and would assign Mr. B his own tasks. Mr. B would call his supervisor for assistance as he would become very flustered and, due to his diagnosis, he needed to stick to a routine. The supervisor told Mr. B to listen to the foreman. Still frustrated, Mr. B attempted to get help from his job coach, but the coach did not help either. This continued for a month.

On his last day of work, Mr. B attempted to speak with the supervisor about the foreman one more time. The supervisor told him to listen to the foreman or "things will go back to the way they were." Mr. B told the supervisor that if things were going to be like this, then he could no longer work there. The supervisor told him, "Good luck with your future endeavors".

Mr. B applied for unemployment benefits but was denied because the Department of Labor determined that he voluntarily left his job without good cause. Mr. B contacted Legal Services of Long Island and spoke with **Staff Attorney Brendle DiGioia in the Public Benefits Unit.**

Ms. DiGioia represented Mr. B at his administrative hearing challenging the Department of Labor's denial of unemployment benefits. **Ms. DiGioia** argued that the supervisor's list was a reasonable accommodation for Mr. B's learning disability and anxiety. Because the supervisor and foreman refused to honor the reasonable accommodation, Mr. B was unable to perform his job duties. Mr. B tried to rectify the situation by going to the supervisor and job coach for help, but they failed to act. Further, because Mr. B sought employment through the "organization", he believed that his disabilities would be accommodated. Because the workplace refused to accommodate him, this counted as a substantial change in the terms of his employment.

The Administrative Law Judge found that Mr. B left his employment with good cause as the terms of his employment were changed by the employer in not honoring his reasonable accommodation, and because he attempted to rectify the situation before leaving. As such, Mr. B was awarded unemployment benefits.

Mr. B expressed gratitude at being taken seriously when his employer so easily brushed him off. Mr. B is now employed with a new employer who accommodates him, and he is excelling in the new position. **Fantastic work, Brendle!**

Victory in Unemployment Benefits Appeal for Supermarket Employee Wrongfully Accused of Misconduct- Legal Services of Long Island recently secured a favorable outcome for Ms. H, a long-time employee of a major supermarket chain, who was denied unemployment benefits following a termination that stemmed from unfounded allegations of workplace misconduct. *Continued on Page 3.*

The Public Benefits Unit provides legal assistance to persons who experience problems with public benefits programs that are administered by the local Departments of Social Services, including Welfare (TANF and Safety Net), Medicaid, Food Stamps (SNAP), Child Care Assistance, HEAP, Emergency shelter for the homeless, Unemployment insurance appeals and overpayments, and other emergency assistance programs We also assist low-income households in establishing Supplemental Needs Trusts to eliminate the Medicaid spend-down and assist homeless families to obtain rent supplements from DSS to enable families to leave the shelters or retain permanent housing. Ms. H sought assistance from **LSLI's Public Benefits Unit** after her employer alleged that she was terminated for reporting to work under the influence of a controlled substance. The employer claimed that Ms. H's use of Sudafed, an overthe-counter cold medication, constituted misconduct warranting disqualification from unemployment benefits.

On the morning in question, Ms. H woke up feeling unwell shortly before the start of her shift. Under her employer's rigid attendance policy, employees are required to call out at least two hours before a scheduled shift to avoid disciplinary action. In an effort to comply with this policy and not jeopardize her employment, Ms. H took Sudafed to relieve her symptoms and reported to work. Shortly after arriving, her condition

worsened, and she requested to go home. Rather than granting her request, management questioned Ms. H for several hours before terminating her employment, citing alleged drug use in the workplace. The Department of Labor subsequently denied her claim for unemployment benefits on the basis of misconduct.

At the administrative hearing, **LSLI law graduate Jacob Mortenson** effectively challenged the employer's claims. Through cross-examination, Mr. Mortenson elicited testimony from the employer's witness confirming that Ms. H was terminated specifically for using Sudafed at work. When asked whether Sudafed is a controlled substance, the witness responded that it was an "over-the-counter controlled substance"—a contradictory and legally inaccurate statement. In fact, Sudafed is not classified as a controlled substance.

In closing arguments, **Mr. Mortenson** emphasized that Ms. H's actions demonstrated a commitment to her job, not misconduct. By choosing to report to work while feeling ill—rather than risk violating company policy—Ms. H acted in good faith, contrary to the definition of misconduct under New York State unemployment law.

The administrative law judge agreed, reversing the Department of Labor's denial and awarding Ms. H approximately \$4,000 in unemployment benefits.

Congratulations to Jacob and the Public Benefits Unit on this important win that reinforces the rights of workers to fair treatment under the law!

Sneak Peak: Homelessness and Reasonable Accommodations by Jacob Mortenson

According to local news outlets, homelessness on Long Island has been increasing in recent years. With likely cuts to federal safety net programs such as SNAP, Medicaid, and subsidized housing, this trend is expected to continue.

First Steps for Assisting Homeless Clients

If you have a client who is homeless and seeking housing assistance, the first step is to direct them to their county's Department of Social Services (DSS). There, they can apply for emergency housing as well as any other public assistance programs for which they may qualify.

It is important to emphasize that DSS housing assistance is temporary. It is not a permanent solution. Clients should be made aware of this and encouraged to develop a long-term housing plan, such as moving in with relatives, renting a room, or applying for low-income affordable housing programs. Nassau Civil Success Stories

Voucher Saved, Home Secured: How LSLI Helped One Family Start Over- After being homeless for 2 ½ years, LSLI client M finally moved into stable housing this past May. M contacted **Supervising Attorney Vivian Storm** in December 2023 regarding a letter that Long Beach Housing Authority (LBHA) sent her stating they were removing her from the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program because she let her voucher expire.

M's problems began in 2022. At that point, M had been a Long Beach Housing recipient for 10 + years in 2022. The housing authority stopped paying M's HCV landlord the Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) because the landlord had failed to maintain the property, and the premises did not pass inspection upon renewal due to an extreme infestation of roaches. The landlord brought M into court on a holdover eviction proceeding in May of 2022.*

Before New York State expanded funding for eviction defense services, Long Beach tenants like M routinely faced court without assistance from an attorney. Rather than being able to demand that her apartment be brought up to standard, M, acting without counsel, entered into a stipulation in June 2022 with the landlord's attorney and, within that stipulation, agreed to vacate by August 31, 2022, in exchange for the tenant share of her rent being waived for July and August.

M and her grandson were evicted on September 15, 2022, and were placed by the Department of Social Services in an emergency shelter in Farmingdale. M's grandson had to commute to elementary school in Long Beach for two and a half years. For the next year, amid rising rents in Long Beach, M's search for a new apartment that would keep her grandson in the school district was fruitless. The LBHA's December 2023 letter, referenced above, threatened to end M's last hopes of returning to Long Beach. When M contacted Legal Services of Long Island (LSLI), she faced permanent homelessness because of her landlord's failure to maintain her apartment.

Attorney Storm found a lottery at a new construction building in Long Beach with apartments set aside for low-income tenants and assisted M in applying. But the apartment would still be far out of reach for M and her grandson without her HCV. So **Attorney Storm** requested an informal hearing challenging M's termination from the HCV program.

Staff Attorney Virginia Conroy handled the informal hearing at the LBHA in January 2024 and prevailed in getting M's voucher reinstated for a six-month period to be renewed. However, when M finally received word this past March of 2025 that she won a lottery position for one of the reduced-rate units she was hoping for; however, at that point the 6-month period had expired. **Attorney Conroy** wrote to LBHA with the documents from M's new landlord and went with M to LBHA to get the voucher extended again. She was again successful in preserving M's voucher.

If it were not for the collaboration between **Attorney Conroy**, demonstrating that LBHA improperly terminated M's Section 8 voucher, and **Attorney Storm** finding the lottery and assisting M in applying for it, M would not only not have this wonderful luxury apartment, but she would have lost her Housing Choice Voucher. Many congratulations to **Vivian and Virginia** on great teamwork and a job well done!

*A holdover eviction proceeding is when the landlord is seeking to end a written lease early (per rules within the lease that allow the landlord to end lease early) or the landlord does not want to renew the lease or wants to end a month-to-month rental.

Advocacy Tip!

Under the warranty of habitability, tenants have the right to a livable, safe and sanitary apartment, a right that is implied in every written or oral residential lease. Any lease provision that waives this right is contrary to public policy and is therefore void. Examples of a breach of this warranty include the failure to provide heat or hot water on a regular basis, or the failure to rid an apartment of an insect infestation.

Any uninhabitable condition caused by the tenant or persons under the tenant's direction or control does not constitute a breach of the warranty of habitability. In such a case, it is the tenant's responsibility to remedy the condition (Real Property Law §235-b).

Nassau Civil Unit assists tenants with low-income in summary eviction proceedings, in administrative hearings challenging termination or denial of participation in the Housing Choice Voucher (Section 8) program, and in grievance hearings contesting proposed terminations from public housing. We will consider bringing affirmative litigation in State Supreme or Federal District Court to assert rights under the United States Housing Act of 1937, the Fair Housing Act, NY State Human Rights Law, and other Civil Rights statutes. Consumer Debt Unit Success Stories

LSLI Team Clears Debt for Suffolk Couple Facing Medical Hardship- The Suffolk County Consumer Debt Unit received a call from a client who, both she and her husband, suffer from severe chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, preventing them from working. The client's husband is on oxygen 24 hours a day. To pay for basic essentials, the client and her husband rely on food stamps (SNAP), Medicare, and Social Security Disability Insurance ("SSDI"). Their SSDI provides them with a combined income of \$1,660 per month, which barely covers their rent. One day, to her horror, the client discovered she was being sued for the outstanding balance on a debt she could not pay. Unable to afford a lawyer, she tried her best to file a pro se answer. She then discovered Legal Services of Long Island and obtained free legal representation from Staff Attorney Maria DeGennaro of the Consumer Debt Legal Assistance Project Attorney DeGennaro filed an amended answer. Then, she tasked Law Student Intern Trevor Busch with gathering all evidence of their hardship, including their Social Security Award letters and a financial worksheet. Intern Busch was then tasked with drafting a letter and requesting from the Plaintiff a dismissal with prejudice of the lawsuit, with the goal of alleviating the client of 100% of their debt on the matter. Intern Busch is a professional airline pilot and decided to enroll at Touro Law Center in Central Islip, NY, in 2024 because he wanted to learn something new. He received first-hand experience with helping clients in need while interning with LSLI. With Attorney DeGennaro's guidance, Intern Busch's letter to the Plaintiff highlighted the client's extreme financial hardships and the exempt status of Social Security benefits from garnishment due to a judgment. As a result of these efforts, the Plaintiff closed the client's account and dismissed the entire lawsuit against her. Because this was Trevor's very first experience helping somebody in any legal capacity, he had the privilege of calling the client to deliver the good news! Great work Maria and Trevor!

Persistence Pays Off: LSLI Attorney Blocks Multiple Credit Card Lawsuits for Disabled Client- LSLI Client KS had settled a credit card debt lawsuit pro se in 2021, but fell behind on her payments. KS solely receives income from disability and SNAP benefits, making it hard to keep up with her payments. The credit card attorneys filed a motion to enter a default judgment against her as she had stopped making her payments. She attended the court date and offered to resume payments, but the opposing counsel refused to allow her to continue making payments. KS then contacted Helen Wrobel, Staff Attorney for the Consumer Debt Legal Assistance Project, in October 2023. After multiple phone calls and emails to opposing counsel, Helen was finally able to convince them to enter into a new settlement agreement with KS. Although KS's income from disability and SNAP benefits is completely protected from garnishment, KS did not want to risk having a judgment entered and her bank account frozen, as banks have been known to freeze bank accounts even when protected funds are present.

After handling the first matter, KS notified **Attorney Wrobel** of two separate credit card lawsuits. It is very common to have more than one credit card lawsuit with the high cost of living on Long Island and the low income for clients on disability. Through early intervention on the second lawsuit, **Helen** successfully got the Plaintiff to discontinue the lawsuit. The third lawsuit is expected to be dismissed towards the end of summer. **Congratulations, Helen, on your continued determination and perseverance to help your client!**

Advocacy Tip!

Contrary to popular belief, you will not immediately get a court date when you are sued for on a consumer debt matter (ex. credit card debt or medical debt). A court date will not be scheduled until after the defendant files an answer with the court.

ICAN Unit Success Stories

From Denial to Approval: LSLI Secures Lifesaving Home Care for Elderly Client-Amanda Davis, ICAN Unit staff attorney, recently assisted a client in her early 80s who has several diagnoses, including dementia and a history of falls, as well as incontinence. The client resides with her elderly spouse. The client's family contacted the client's Managed Long Term Care (MLTC) plan and requested an increase in Consumer Directed Personal Assistance hours from 77 hours per week to 24-hour daily split-shift care, to help provide her with regular care throughout the night. The 77 hours of weekly care did not include any overnight care, even though during the night, the client requires frequent help with toileting. She also needs repositioning in her bed to help prevent bed sores and infections.

The client's MLTC plan responded to the increase request by offering only live-in care during the overnight hours. Live-in care was insufficient to meet the client's needs; the aide could not perform all necessary overnight duties and still get five consecutive hours of sleep during an eight-hour sleep period, as mandated by state labor law. By contrast, the requested daily 24-hour split-shift care would allow for frequent enough care to meet all the client's daily needs.

Attorney Davis drafted and submitted an External Appeal on the client's behalf, complete with supporting documents. Letters from the client's treating medical providers, nightly logs, and assessments conducted by the Plan that support the client's need for the additional care were submitted to the New York State Department of Financial Services. Within 30 days, a physician who reviewed the case agreed with the client and her treating medical providers and determined that the care was necessary and that the plan had acted improperly in denying the requested care. Thanks to this favorable decision, the client's family was able to hire additional aides to staff her case, and she began receiving the necessary care. This is allowing the client to remain healthy and more independent at home with her spouse and in her community. Congratulations, Amanda, on a job well done!

2025 Commitment to Justice Reception

Speech from LSLI Client Speaker Geraldine Garcia

Good evening, everyone. My name is Geraldine Garcia, and I'm a survivor of domestic violence. My story begins at the age of 22, when I had my first baby, who is now 14. Two years later, I had my daughter, who is now 12, with someone I thought was charming—turns out he wasn't. I was born and raised in Guatemala and came here when I was 18. I made sure I learned to speak and write English so I could communicate here; cultures are very different. Back home, they taught us to stick with family no matter what, but they never mentioned anything about sticking with abuse. After my son was born, my partner began drinking and smoking marijuana every day. He

complained that he was sick and had some illness that was killing him slowly, but doctors never found anything wrong. He used to sleep all day and go out to bars every night, which became his routine. That's when the abuse started. At first, it was verbal abuse, and then it turned physical. I stayed for about six years because of my kids. He used to threaten me with taking them away if I left. My kids are my biggest blessing, and I'd do anything for them. One day, he accused my only family here, my brother, of something that didn't happen, even though my brother is the only one I can always count on in this country. That's when I decided to make a change and reached out to The Retreat, a domestic violence organization. It was there that I met Stacy, one of their counselors. Upon receiving my temporary Order of Protection in court, Stacy referred me to Larry Tuthill [and Kayla Schunk, attorneys at Legal Services of Long Island]. Since that first meeting, they have protected me and informed me about everything I needed to know in Family Court. I was terrified, but I was lucky to have great people supporting me. I started learning my rights.

Larry represented me in Family Court and secured a permanent stay-away order of protection for me and my children, permanently removing my partner from the household. Unfortunately, this made [my partner] even more irate. He continuously violated the Order of Protection, threatening me and trying to get back into the home. Because of these threats, The Retreat gave me a panic button that connected directly to the police department. Thanks to Larry's representation, I obtained a 5-year stay-away order of protection. Although he had mental health and substance abuse problems, he was initially given supervised visits with our children. The visits were supervised by his family, but they eventually stopped because his own family couldn't prevent him from acting inappropriately. The visits were then supervised by a licensed therapist/social worker.

I'm grateful to [LSLI] for helping me get sole legal and residential custody of our children and securing a child support order to help raise them. Then, the COVID-19 pandemic hit, and the support [stopped] being paid by my partner. During this time, my partner had numerous criminal offenses, which led to the suspension of his visitation order. [LSLI] filed a child support violation petition. Currently, my ex's parenting time is suspended pending a mental health and substance abuse evaluation, which he has yet to do.

I have spent almost eight years with Larry and Kayla, meeting monthly or every other month in family court. They worked together, supporting me throughout the process. They have been witnesses to so many actions from my abusive ex-partner, like him taking pictures of them without permission in the courthouse waiting room and even following them on a coffee run—just a few of the scary tactics he used. Larry represented me even after knowing how dangerous my ex was. He never left me, despite the many violations of the stay-away order. My ex stalked me and my kids, and even though Larry and Kayla also experienced harassment from him, they kept helping me. Larry stood up for me and my kids every time.

Even when I didn't agree with court decisions, Larry took the time to explain them to me in ways I could understand, making sure I fully grasped both the good and bad aspects. The help I received from Stacy at The Retreat and Larry and Kayla from [LSLI] empowered me and made me stronger, both emotionally and mentally. I'm forever grateful to them for not just helping me escape an abusive relationship but also teaching me so much, making me feel whole again.

As of now, I have full custody of my kids, and my abuser has supervised visits only. After years of trying to prove his instability, I never gave up for my kids. In the beginning, we even got served with eviction papers from my abuser's dad because we had been staying at his foreclosed house. My kids had just started school two weeks prior. But thankfully, my kids didn't have to suffer any of this. I always made sure they stayed in the same school district, with the same friends and activities, and that they wouldn't live in fear. We had to stay in different places and change our address repeatedly to keep them at the same school. All I want for them is to be happy and have a normal life where they don't have to worry about someone trying to hurt or manipulate us. Thanks to Larry, I can say that I've achieved that. I'm still doing it, and I joke with Larry, telling him he can't retire yet because we still have six years left, just in case we need him again. To anyone out there, I can tell you: THERE IS HOPE, AND YOU CAN DO IT. NEVER GIVE UP. I'll forever be grateful to Larry and Kayla for their amazing work on my case and for staying by my side through it all.

I'm happy to say my life is no longer filled with fear. I'm currently working, standing on my own two feet, and no longer manipulated and tormented by my abuser. I'm one of the lucky ones. Thanks to the help I received, I was able to escape that abusive and scary period of my life.

I'm standing right here tonight, alive and well with my beautiful children by my side—because of them. I got the help I needed to get my kids and me out of a very dangerous situation. Sometimes we stay in an abusive relationship because we don't know there's a way out, but there is. There are people like Larry and Kayla and everyone at Legal Services of Long Island who are willing to go above and beyond to help and support you through the process.

Lastly, I want to thank all the supporters here tonight. Your support of Legal Services of Long Island has made a huge positive impact on my life, and with your continued help, they will be able to assist others like me to escape abusive relationships and turn their lives around.

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
